

Dear friends,

Going way back in history, Michaelmas, (which St Oswalds will be marking this week) was the beginning and end of the husbandman's or farmer's year. Harvest was over, the reeve of the Manor would make out the accounts for the year and Michaelmas hiring fairs were held to organise the work force for the months ahead.

The name itself comes from a Christian festival, the Feast of Saint Michael and All Angels, celebrating the Archangel Michael, one of the principal angelic warriors, who was said to protect humankind against the dark of the night.

Folklore in the British Isles rather comically suggests that Michaelmas Day is the last day for picking blackberries. This was based on the story that when Saint Michael expelled Lucifer from Heaven, he fell into a thorny blackberry bush (bottom first!) and cursed the fruit with his fiery breath. So, it was considered bad luck to eat the berries after this day, so country folk made a Michaelmas pie to quickly use up the last of the season's fruit.

Now, as I thought about that, two things came to mind, (apart from all the blackberry and apple crumbles I have demolished lately; so much so that the buttons on my cassock have begun to strain a little. So maybe I, like those country folk, need to quickly take onboard the tradition of not eating such things after Michaelmas!)

The first more important thing was really related to the wonderful and often unsung heroes that work so hard in the agricultural sector so we can all readily enjoy God's bounty each day. If that is you or somebody know, thank you and rest assured that we will be remembering you all in our harvest services.

The second had to do with that thought of Angels. Often, we only think of Angels around Christmas don't we? But the truth is that the Bible and church tradition is full of stories related to these heavenly beings who act on behalf of God to bring messages, help us worship, protect us and even act as guides when times get tough.

Whatever your thoughts are about that, these stories act in some way to remind us that we are never truly alone, God is with us, even when we struggle to feel or see him. Perhaps we could all do with being reminded of that right now as the covid pandemic continues to affect us all in so many different ways.

It is my Michaelmas prayer that we would all be emboldened by the thought that we are not alone - God and his servants, Saint Michael and his fellow angels, are there, helping us just as they always have been, guiding us on. May their light and the presence of our God of love bring us all strength and peace at this difficult time. Blessings FrMurray



As we acknowledge Bible Sunday this month, it is a good opportunity to ask the question: Why should I read the Bible?

The Bible is the world's best-selling book of all time. However, it is not one book, but a library of 66 books, composed by 44 writers over a period of 1500 years in a range of literature including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic Despite having a number of different writers, the Bible claims one author, God himself! This is the basis of the unity of its message and authoritative claim to be the primary way by which God speaks to us: 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and presents itself as a manual for life, equipping us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit to guide us in applying the words to our lives: 'the Spirit will guide you into all truth' (John 16:13).

However, the Bible could also be described as a *love letter* from God, as He uses it to deepen our relationship with him. As Jesus said: *'You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by them you possess eternal life. These are the Scriptures that testify about me'* (John 5:39,40). Christians follow a person not a book, and the Scriptures are intended to help us to know Jesus better. At her coronation the Queen was given a Bible with the words *'the most precious thing this world affords'*. Does this reflect our own attitude to the Bible?

Edith Cavell - nurse

Edith Cavell is a good saint for NHS workers this year: she cared for the sick despite the danger to her own safety.

Edith was a vicar's daughter from Swardeston in Norfolk, where she was born in 1865. She became a governess, but her heart was for nursing, so she went on to train at the London Hospital, before nursing in various hospitals such as St Pancras and Manchester.

When Edith was 42, she decided to go abroad, and was appointed matron of a large training centre for nurses in Brussels. She was still there seven years later, when the First World War broke out and German troops invaded Belgium on their way to Paris and the Channel Ports.

Edith's nursing school became a Red Cross hospital, and she turned down the opportunity to return to the safety of England. Instead, her nurses tended wounded soldiers from both German and Allied armies.

Sadly, in 1915, when the Germans began their occupation of Brussels, they took a dim view of Edith's work. But they would have been even more unhappy had they known she was helping to smuggle 200 British soldiers across the border into the Netherlands!

Finally, the Germans arrested Edith in August 1915, and put her into solitary confinement. They tricked her into confessing to a charge which carried the death penalty. But Edith refused to show either regret at what she had done, or any fear or bitterness towards her captors.

On 11th October 1915, the night before her execution, Edith was visited by the Anglican chaplain to Brussels, the Revd Stirling Gahan. Together they said the words of *Abide with Me*, and Edith received her last Holy Communion.

She told Gahan: "I am thankful to have had these ten weeks of quiet to get ready. Now I have had them and have been kindly treated here. I expected my sentence and I believe it was just. Standing, as I do, in view of God and eternity, I realise that patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness to anyone."

Edith was shot by a firing squad next day, on 12th October 1915.

After the war her body was exhumed and buried in Norwich Cathedral. Her memorial service in Westminster Abbey attracted thousands. A commemorative statue of her stands near Trafalgar Square.

Church of England and RSCM await next steps following study into singing safety

The Church of England and Royal School of Church Music (RSCM) have been awaiting updated guidance on singing in places of worship after findings of a Government-backed study were published.

The research project, known as 'PERFORM', recently published its findings on measuring aerosol production from humans. It measured singing, speaking and breathing in a zero-background environment.

Researchers reported a steep rise in aerosol mass with increase in the loudness of the singing and speaking, rising by as much as a factor of 20-30. However, it was also found that singing does not produce substantially more aerosol than speaking at a similar volume.


The RSCM's Director, Hugh Morris said: "We welcome this news. Singing is of such importance in worship, and this is a really encouraging step towards its safe resumption. "It is of course vital that all choirs and singing groups follow the relevant government advice, and so we look forward to receiving the latest guidance in this important area."

The Church of England and RSCM both regularly update their advice following the publication of Government guidance.


