

#### Harvest Thanksgiving

Recently as I have been walking through the lanes and across the fields in and around our villages with Pickles, (who coincidentally has just got home from puppy behaviour school and feeling rather pleased with herself for doing well, has now decided to do the opposite of everything I ask her and has caused absolute mayhem by stealing and running off into the muddiest part of the vicarage garden with one of my best tea towels; 'time and money obviously well spent!)

Anyway, during those walks, I have been blessed by the sheer beauty of the place we call home. I have to say since moving to this 'shire' I have been blown away by peaceful tranquillity of our villages and I am thankful for that blessing during this time of global challenge.

That blessing has increased recently too, it increased as I have watched the landscape change as our farming community has worked the land and tended our animals in readiness for the harvest.

This past week I began celebrating several harvest festivals with the school children at St Oswald's and it has been a privilege to talk about the work of our agricultural workers and to pray for them in these challenging and uncertain times.

If you are one of those workers; please know how thankful we are for your endeavours, and I hope knowing that we and all our village children are thinking of and holding you all in our prayers will encourage you in some way.

During our school harvest celebrations, we have been singing modern songs of thankfulness for crops and farmers, (*my favourite so far is one called the potato song!*)

However, most of us will probably be more familiar with the old classics like *'Come ye thankful people come'* or *"We plough the fields and scatter''*.

So, many of us will think of harvest and instantly remember singing out the words of "we plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the land, but it is fed and watered by God's almighty hand" in places of worship bedecked in flowers and foliage of Autumn shades complimented by abundant fruits and bountiful vegetables and perhaps surrounding a spectacular harvest loaf in the shape of a wheat sheaf, (perhaps even with the additional field mouse hiding away in the corner of the loaf which always brings such delight to the children when they spot him!)

The tastes and textures, smells, and sounds of Harvest are to me and so many others such a quintessentially British celebration and I am so grateful to now be living in a place where the words of our favourite harvest hymns come alive as I look around at our beautiful landscape every day. The hymn, "We plough the fields", was written by Matthias Claudius and was inspired by a 'peasants' song he had heard in one of his local village farmhouses; the hymn we now enjoy is a product of his thankfulness to God for all the gifts we receive and is said to have originally had 17 verses! To pen and sing a hymn that long he must have been very thankful indeed!!

Through all the extraordinary changes and upsets of our routines that we have known in the last year and a half or so we still have just cause for thanksgiving. There has been the occasional blip in our garages or supermarkets owing to panic buying but most of us have been fortunate in having decent and more than adequate food throughout. We might have sometimes had to wait or not get our usual choices but thanks to the unfailing work of our farmers, fishermen, suppliers, shops, and other frontline workers, we have not gone hungry. For this we must give hearty and humble thanks.

And there lays the fundamental message from the vicarage this Harvest 2021. Yes, times have been tough, there is still a long narrow path to travel before we are pandemic free, but there is light and hope at the end of the tunnel, the harvest is bountiful and we can rejoice because no matter the challenges we face, or how dark things might appear, we have not, nor shall we ever face them alone. We have each other and we have our God who promises to walk with all of us, no matter what.

So, whatever you do to make Harvest Thanksgiving 2021 special let us not lose heart or forget that message of hope. And I challenge us all to at least once this harvest time whether in the bath, the field, or the kitchen to join in with me (*and Pickles*) in singing out with all of our might...

"All good gifts around us are sent from heaven above. Then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord for all his love!"



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#### Please join the 'St Oswald's Lower Peover 100 Club'

Dating from 1269, St Oswald's church has been central to the village of Lower Peover for centuries. Throughout that time, it has been the spiritual home of many people, and not just those living in the village itself.

It still fulfils that role today, a peaceful haven in an ever busier and complicated world. As a Grade 1 listed building, it enjoys a setting of particular importance, and the assumption is that it always will be. But escalating costs mean that we can no longer take that for granted. Buildings such as St Oswald's are hugely expensive to maintain and ever-increasing running costs need to be found.

It is a sobering thought that our Parish Share (the money we pay to Chester Diocese for our church and a vicar) is £51,395. That is £988 each week. That is before any lighting, heating, maintenance etc. is taken into consideration, and, contrary to what many people still think, the State does <u>not</u> pay towards a church's upkeep.

We launched the 100 Club in May 2008 and membership currently stands at 71, although it has been as high as 106. The club currently raises about £2,500 each year (after prizes) and really does make a huge difference to our resources. So far it has raised over £25,000 for the running costs of our church. And all for the minimal cost of £1 per week to members!

The 100 Club works in this way:

We collect £1 a week from each member per number held, which can be paid either as an annual fee of £52, or £13 per quarter, by standing order. Members are allocated individual numbers and each month two numbers are drawn. The first receives a prize of £70, the second receives £30. The remainder of the proceeds go to the church. You may individually hold more than one number and indeed, past winners have often had multiple holdings. It really is as simple as that!

The 100 Club is designed to appeal to regular churchgoers and those people who may not be able to worship regularly with us, but who also think it is important that the church remains open as an important part of village life.

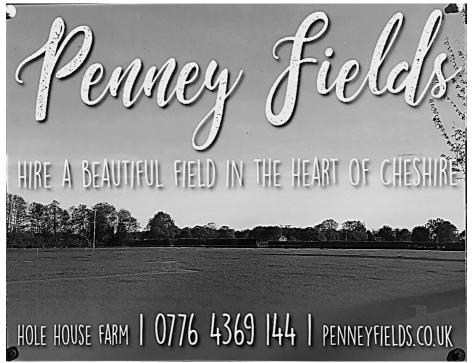

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#### Good reasons to have a church magazine

After a year of lockdown, should we still bother with church magazines now that church life is picking up again? *Yes!* 

*It is read by lots of people*. If each issue is read on average by two people, then more people see it than ever go to church. So, it is a very good way of putting Christian values and ideas into people's hands, whether they come to church or not.

*It is a service to the community*. Communities need local networks to thrive. Magazines are a great way of binding together the people who live in one place. Just delivering the church magazine is a way to get to know the area and the people.

*It helps build bridges with other Christian churches in the area.* We can share some details of their meetings and events.

*It can make money.* Well, enough to cover the costs of production! Let us aim for a revenue balanced on paid subscriptions and advertising.

*It is seen by those outside the church family.* Think of the people just moving into our area, or those who live here already and want to get married or to baptise their child. Our magazine can help them see the sort of community we are, and that we would welcome them to join us.

*It is read by people who do not go to church, but who know someone who does.* This is a major way of how groups, including churches, grow. Not many people walk into a church off their own bat. Most people are invited, or already have a connection.

It supports local businesses. Local businesses who advertise locally, can thrive.

*It helps people develop skills.* The editorial team will learn about design, marketing, GDPR, editing, copyright, writing, selling, artwork - and apologising.

*It can help inform our community about itself* – especially if we include a local history or local natural history section!

SO, don't believe it if someone tells you that print is dead. It is not. Many people still prefer to read something they can hold in their hands. The future is not EITHER print OR digital, but BOTH. People will flick through a magazine that arrives through the door, even though they may never dream of visiting their local church's website.

#### Meeting the needs of older people

These days there seems to be a day for everything, including the United Nations' 'International day for Older Persons', which is observed on  $1^{st}$  October. So perhaps October is a good month to think about meeting the needs of older people in church.

Many churches employ children's workers or youth leaders – but how many have appointed people to minister specifically to the older people in their congregation and beyond?

Age UK has called on the Government to give the NHS and social care services extra resources to help older people make the best possible recovery. With coronavirus now hopefully in retreat in the UK, the charity has also appealed to the wider public to keep supporting the older people in their lives.

It said: "The impact of the pandemic on the health and wellbeing of some older people in early 2021 is so demonstrably severe that it raises big questions over whether they will be able to 'bounce back'."

Against this background, Maggie Dodd, the first Anna Chaplain in Hertfordshire, explained: "Our vision is that older people are cherished and supported within their church communities, and also beyond, in the wider community.

"Often you have people who used to attend church, and they have become a little more frail and not able to attend or they have moved to a care home or sheltered housing, and they just lose touch with what's going on. 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
