Dear Friends,

It is hard to believe that I am already writing the letter for the December edition of our magazine!

Very soon (Covid restrictions allowing) we will be lighting our purple Advent candles in church, then after weeks of anticipation we will finally get to Christmas Day and be able to light the white candle at the centre of the Advent ring to celebrate the joyful news that Jesus, the light of the world, has been born!

St John beautifully puts it like this: "the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it." Something I think we all need to hear after such a challenging year!

A little while ago I was chatting away with somebody in the village, and I commented that I simply could not wait for Advent and Christmas to really get going, their response was to smile and then tell me that I was just a big kid!

Now those of you who know me at all will probably agree with that. But the truth is, I am hoping that as we all journey through the next few weeks, you too will begin to feel a little seasonal childlike awe and be touched by the 'magic' of what Advent and Christmas is all about.

As you all know the church has been unable to do all the usual things we would have done over the last few months and sadly we have also been very restricted in the services we have been able to offer too. Covid has had a profound impact on us all as individuals and as a whole community. There have definitely been moments when I was very aware that without my faith in Christ's light, the sense of darkness that sometimes accompanies us in our daily struggles may well have been overwhelming.

But that's why St John's words are so encouraging; Jesus came into this world as a baby born in a poor stable. He and his parents were forced to flee as refugees from cruelty and the rest of his life was one that was ever familiar with the everyday challenges many of us at some point have faced.

He therefore understands only too well our fears, our sadness, and our despairs. Jesus is God with us, 'Immanuel'. He comes to stand alongside us and offer his presence to comfort and strengthen, his light to lighten the darkness.

More than that he comes to offer a greater hope. The hope of the kingdom of God, a kingdom of immeasurable love, a kingdom where the lion will lie down with the lamb and where swords will be beaten into ploughshares. Where sickness, tears and death

will be no more. This is the kingdom that Christ came to earth to bring a kingdom of grace, peace and hope.

So often, we fail to see God's kingdom here on earth don't we? When terrible events happen in our lives and in our world people often ask the question;" Where is God?" My answer to that is that God is right here in the midst of us. His kingdom can be seen in every act of good that surrounds us, every hand that reaches out to hold us when we stumble or fall, every unexpected kindness of a stranger, every friend's arm that is put around us when we weep, every patient ear that listens to us when we mourn.

Wherever there is love, there is God, and the power of that love shines as a light that can never be extinguished. May we all find our hope renewed by the light, joy and peace that the Christ Child brings this advent, and may we all find ourselves this Christmas and new year being blessed by love, his greatest and most wonderful gift of all.

My dear Nephew Darren

I am sorry I was not alive during that wonderful four-year period when Oliver Cromwell abolished Christmas. Just think! No Christmas parties, no carol services, no cards to send and no frantic last-minute shopping. That man was a hero!

Planning for Christmas at St James' normally starts on 2nd January. By Easter, the flowers for church have been colour coordinated, the seating plans and table decorations for the Christmas party have been allocated (with nominated reserves in case someone should inconveniently die in the intervening eight months). Long before Summer is over, the tree lights have been tested, music for the 9 Lessons and Carols Service has been chosen and the service sheets printed. Way before the dark nights set in, car parking attendants will have been found, those who are to light all the candles will have been rehearsed to perfection and the brass lectern has had its annual polish.

We do not do spontaneity at St James. If ever there was a service when time for something unexpected was allowed, its place would be announced in the order of service, how long it would happen unexpectedly would have been decided by a committee and who was to be spontaneous would have been allocated on a rota.

The one person none of these well-meaning, efficient, committed organisers can control is the Rector. You could call it a staff perk.

Carols will (accidentally, of course) be announced in the wrong order; if verse 3 was to be omitted, I announce it will be verse 4. This keeps the organist on his toes while the choir hovers on the point of a collective nervous breakdown. At the Christmas supper, my introductory welcome speech and extensive grace make those in the kitchen wonder if the vegetables being boiled should better be served as thick soup.

I offer the helpful suggestion that the tree, having been installed and decorated in the chancel, may perhaps look better in the sanctuary and I turn all the heating off throughout the season, explaining that it will help the flowers to last. All Services will start five minutes early (was my watch rather fast?) so I can look disapprovingly at those still coming in while we are singing the first carol and making it clear that I think they had spent too long in the pub next door.

And so, we all reach Christmas morning, with 12 months of planning having gone yet again slightly awry, with parishioners exhausted and I exhilarated at the chaos that has been created with such ease. Mr Cromwell, your spirit lives on.

A Partridge in a Pear Tree

If there is one thing I like better than one biscuit with my mid-morning and afternoon cuppas, it is two biscuits! More often than not Christmas will usually see a box or tin of exotic biscuits nestling under the tree. Last year was no exception, but on this occasion, it was the design of the tin, rather than the contents which held my attention. Overall, it was finished in a bright poppy red lacquer. On its lid was an ornate pattern of gold leaves which ringed a partridge in a pear tree.

To complete the picture, around the outside of the tin were the other symbols of the well know carol The Twelve Days of Christmas. This got me thinking. What in the world do leaping lords, French hens, pipers piping and partridges in pear trees have to do with Christmas. After much research, I eventually found an answer to the puzzle. It appears the symbols have a religious significance. From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. During that time someone found an ingenious way to get round the ban by writing this carol as a catechism for young Catholics. Each picture in the carol is a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.

Each time I use the tin I am reminded of the story behind the pictures.

12 Drummers Drumming symbolised the twelve points of belief in the Apostles Creed.

11 Pipers Piping stood for the eleven disciples.

10 Lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.

9 Ladies Dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit, love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

8 Maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.

7 Swans a -swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit,

prophecy, serving, teaching, exhortation, contribution, leadership and mercy.

- 6 Geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.
- 5 Gold Rings recalled the first five books of the Old Testament.
- 4 Calling Birds were the four gospels, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.
- 3 French Hens stood for faith, hope and love.
- 2 Turtle Doves were the Old and New Testaments.

The Partridge in the Pear Tree was Jesus Christ.

Lower Peover School Pond Restoration

Earlier in the year, as part of the Parish Plan for Lower Peover, a working party was set up to explore the practicality of clearing the school pond. This pond, whilst mostly on school land, is adjacent to a public footpath. It had become overgrown in recent years and filled with fallen branches and saplings.

Cllr Ros Kendall led this initiative following consultation with the Head Teacher and adjacent land owner. She approached both Cheshire West and Chester Council and Cheshire East Council to see if any grants were available, but without success. A member of the Cheshire Wildlife Trust attended a site meeting to offer advice on improving the area to encourage wildlife. They were unable to offer a grant as unfortunately these are available only for creating new ponds not restoring existing ones.

Following discussion with the Richard Comberbach Trustees, the trustees agreed to fund the enterprise which required the services of a professional tree surgeon. At the end of October Norman Withenshaw, a trustee, arranged for the tree surgeon to cut and clear the huge branches which had fallen from the oak trees into the pond. All the saplings which were silting up the pond were cleared. All that remained was a big clear up job taking away the brash and weeds and debris! Cllr Kendall put out a call to residents, and the Head teacher informed pupils' parents. As a result a working party was formed to come the following weekend to clear up. All the team work had to be carried out with appropriate social distancing and full adherence to the Covid 19 rules. At the end of that day the pond and its surrounds were cleared. Sunlight can now make its way onto the water and the pond is again accessible. The stone retaining wall is visible and the pond dipping platform safe to use again. We hope that wildlife will return and the pupils will enjoy learning from it.

Thanks go to all involved, too many to name. It was a particular pleasure to have the help of three young (strong!) dads from school: Jonathan, Christopher and Graham. And it was very useful having Graham turn up with his farm tractor and trailer so that all the debris was cleared away in one go. It was a great team effort.

Please join the 'St Oswald's Lower Peover 100 Club'

Dating from 1269, St Oswald's church has been central to the village of Lower Peover for centuries. Throughout that time, it has been the spiritual home of many people, and not just those living in the village itself.

It still fulfils that role today, a peaceful haven in an ever busier and complicated world. As a Grade 1 listed building, it enjoys a setting of particular importance, and the assumption is that it always will be. But escalating costs mean that we can no longer take that for granted. Buildings such as St Oswald's are hugely expensive to maintain and ever-increasing running costs need to be found.

It is a sobering thought that our Parish Share (the money we pay to Chester Diocese for our church and a vicar) is £51,395. That is £988 each week. That is before any lighting, heating, maintenance etc. is taken into consideration, and, contrary to what many people still think, the State does <u>not</u> pay towards a church's upkeep.

We launched the 100 Club in May 2008 and membership currently stands at 71, although it has been as high as 106. The club currently raises about £2,500 each year (after prizes) and really does make a huge difference to our resources. So far it has raised over £25,000 for the running costs of our church. And all for the minimal cost of £1 per week to members!

The 100 Club works in this way:

We collect £1 a week from each member per number held, which can be paid either as an annual fee of £52, or £13 per quarter, by standing order. Members are allocated individual numbers and each month two numbers are drawn. The first receives a prize of £70, the second receives £30. The remainder of the proceeds go to the church. You may individually hold more than one number and indeed, past winners have often had multiple holdings. It really is as simple as that!

The 100 Club is designed to appeal to regular churchgoers and those people who may not be able to worship regularly with us, but who also think it is important that the church remains open as an important part of village life.

We really would like to get our membership back up to at least 100 and hope that if you are reading this you may feel able to help – all for £1 per week! Please do join the 100 Club by completing the membership form at the back of this magazine or online at our website, and simply post it back to me.
