The end of February and the beginning of March this year coincides with the beginning of Lent.

The nights are drawing out now (*hurrah*!) and already the slightly lighter evenings seem to make one think of last year's warm barmy nights (*when it was so nice to sit in the garden with a cheeky gin and tonic into the early hours*!)

Even in February we were getting one or two days that felt positively spring-like -I have already noticed the snow drops, crocuses and daffs pocking their heads through the fallen leaves, bringing a little joy; although we should not get too complacent, or we might find ourselves suddenly seeing a cold East or North wind strike again, *just to remind us that Winter has not quite finished with us yet!*

So, to Lent.

This might mean taking up a new hobby, learning something new, (do feel free to pop along to see our bell ringers in action at the church), helping out in the wider community for example; visiting a lonely neighbour, volunteering at the food bank, picking up litter, or coming up with fund raising ideas for the local church, or simply just stopping for a moment and realising when out walking in Peover with your beloved four legged friend the beauty of the place we have been called by God to live in. (*Pickles the vicarage pup likes that idea the best!*).

To be honest, I always feel that the best approach is to do a bit of both as a more positive and productive way of preparing ourselves for the joy of Easter – a bit of self-restraint never hurt anyone, and making a positive change or contribution to the community we live in can be transformative and lead to a kind of blessing we might never have imagined before.

But however you intend to mark Lent and then celebrate Easter over the rest of March and April, it is my hope and my prayer that it will be a positive time of reflection and ultimately an amazing time of positive change and relentless joy. After all that is what these seasons are all about, thinking about, and then celebrating with copious amounts of laughter and wonderment, the miraculous and immeasurable grace and love of God.

May God Bless you all, and please think of me in your prayers as I will really be struggling without my beloved jelly beans. *Easter, please come quick the vicar needs you!!!!*

Reflecting faith - what birds can remind us about our faith

There are many depictions of 'creatures' used in decorations in and on our church buildings. Some are beautifully carved in the highly decorated ends of choir stalls. Others can be found on the pew-ends. Sometimes there are carvings of birds, such as the pelican and peacock. The peacock is known for its magnificent tail feathers, which it displays to both impress and deter aggressors. From the early days of Christianity, the peacock has been used to symbolise eternal life, and so is often seen carved into memorial stones in the churchyard. This is because it renews itself each year, by shedding its old feathers and growing new ones. Of course, this also links to Christ's resurrection, as the peacock is visually reborn and whole again.

The pelican is a less obvious Christian symbol, although quite common in all art forms. It is seen as a symbol of atonement because when observed by naturalists many centuries ago, they misinterpreted the red tip on its long bill. They saw the pelican start to prune its feathers, and it appeared to them to be ripping open its breast, so as to feed its young with its own blood. This story became symbolic for the Atonement, where Jesus allowed Himself to be pierced so that we may live. And although ornithologists view the red tip differently today, the pelican continues in its representation.

CHILDREN'S CHURCH

Children's Church is going from strength to strength and is an important part of church life. We are continuing to meet in church at 11am and staying for the notices/first hymn/confession and then going to the Little House for our activities.

We have had lots of fun learning about Jesus and listened to his stories, singing, praying and doing crafts. We return to church for Holy Communion or a blessing. Father Murray has been giving the children a lovely blessing altogether. Before the last hymn, Father Murray asks the children and leaders to talk about what they have been doing and show any craft activity. Numbers have remained steady and the children and leaders are getting to know each other well.

At the All- age service the children and families have been involved in leading the family prayers and singing their own song with actions. In November the children were accompanied on the guitar by Rosie.

Advent and Christmas were special times for the children as they were involved in lighting the candles on the advent wreath and bringing presents to less well-off children and also receiving a gift themselves from Father Murray at the Gift service. They also participated in dressing the crib on the Sunday before Christmas. On Christmas Day many of the children, parents and leaders were involved in a dressed-up nativity and thoroughly enjoyed it.

At the Epiphany service on January 1st the children led the prayers and were involved in the talk.

Children's church restarted on January 8th where the baptism of the Lord was the theme and the children brought paper doves into church towards the end of the service. On 15th they sang "Give me joy in my heart" on their own as the last hymn with the congregation joining in after verse one and chorus which was really lovely and enjoyed by all.

This is following a session on the 3rd Sunday of the month which is focused on singing.

It is lovely to see these young families joining in our services and they need our welcome and encouragement.

17th March: St Patrick, beloved apostle to Ireland

St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. If you have ever been in New York on St Patrick's Day, you would think he was the patron saint of New York as well, the flamboyant parade is full of American/Irish razzmatazz.

It is all a far cry from the hard life of this 5th century humble Christian who became in time both bishop and apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a town councillor in the west of England, between the Severn and the Clyde, but as a young man he was captured by Irish pirates, kidnapped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery. He was made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his earlier years, when he "knew not the true God".

Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him with them away from Ireland.

Patrick's writings are the first literature certainly identified from the British Church. They reveal sincere simplicity and a deep pastoral care. He wanted to abolish paganism, idolatry, and was ready for imprisonment or death in the following of Christ.

Patrick remains the most popular of the Irish saints. The principal cathedral of New York is dedicated to him as, of course, is the Anglican cathedral of Dublin.

Please join the 'St Oswald's Lower Peover 100 Club'

Dating from 1269, St Oswald's church has been central to the village of Lower Peover for centuries. Throughout that time, it has been the spiritual home of many people, and not just those living in the village itself. It still fulfils that role today, a peaceful haven in an ever busier and complicated world. As a Grade 1 listed building, it enjoys a setting of particular importance, and the assumption is that it always will be. But escalating costs mean that we can no longer take that for granted. Buildings such as St Oswald's are hugely expensive to maintain and ever-increasing running costs need to be found.

It is a sobering thought that our Parish Share (the money we pay to Chester Diocese for our church and a vicar) is £51,395. That is £988 each week. That is before any lighting, heating, maintenance etc. is taken into consideration, and, contrary to what many people still think, the State does <u>not</u> pay towards a church's upkeep.

We launched the 100 Club in May 2008 and membership currently stands at 71, although it has been as high as 106. The club currently raises about £2,500 each year (after prizes) and really does make a huge difference to our resources. So far it has raised over £25,000 for the running costs of our church. And all for the minimal cost of £1 per week to members!

The 100 Club works in this way:

We collect £1 a week from each member per number held, which can be paid either as an annual fee of £52, or £13 per quarter, by standing order. Members are allocated individual numbers and each month two numbers are drawn. The first receives a prize of £70, the second receives £30. The remainder of the proceeds go to the church. You may individually hold more than one number and indeed, past winners have often had multiple holdings. It really is as simple as that! The 100 Club is designed to appeal to regular churchgoers and those people who may not be able to worship regularly with us, but who also think it is important that the church remains open as an important part of village life. We really would like to get our membership back up to at least 100 and hope that if you are reading this you may feel able to help – all for £1 per week! Please do join the 100 Club by completing the membership form at the back of this magazine or online at our website, and simply post it back to me. Many congratulations to all our winners – and our thanks to all members who are currently supporting the 100 Club. Stay safe and thank you.

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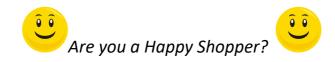
