


Dear Friends,

It was really good to see our church so full-on Easter morning – from the ancient first communion with all its chants and candles to the later service with all ages coming together in celebration of what is vital about the Christian faith, namely, that light always, and in the end, triumphs over darkness, Jesus beating death for us all. (And an Easter egg hunt!)

From now until Pentecost - or Whitsunday as we used to call it - we are in the great period of Eastertide - this is a period of recognising the blessing of new life, purpose and joy; , it is not easy to escape this season of joy whether you are in church or not. The gardens and fields around the parish are full of new growth, lambs, blossom and occasionally some warm sunshine too.

So too is the nation invited to join in with another source of joy this May. The King's Coronation. When the King's coronation takes place, it will include three significant ceremonies: his taking of oaths, his anointing and then the crowning. It is the anointing which is the most sacred moment and what I want us to think about as we look forward further into 2023 and the kings new reign.

It signifies God's blessing being conferred on the new king during the ceremony, just as anointing does during baptism, confirmation and a vicar's ordination. While water, used in baptism, signifies being spiritually washed clean, this sticky oil represents the 'sticking' or lasting nature of a God's blessing.

Anointing a chosen leader in this way is mentioned several times in the Old Testament. Saul was singled out as a ruler through anointing. There are several moments that tell us about king David being anointed by his priest and then there is Solomon, David's son, who is recognised as the ideal king in the British coronation tradition. For more than 1,000 years the words of 1 Kings 1:38–40 have been said during the coronation, and since the 18th century sung as an anthem specially composed by Handel for the coronation of George II: Zadok the Priest and Nathan the prophet anointed Solomon King. And all the people rejoiced and said: God save the King! Long live the King! May the King live for ever, Amen, Hallelujah.

The anointing is so powerful a moment that it should help to spiritually sustain the king for the rest of his life. Perfumed with sesame, rose, jasmine, cinnamon, neroli, benzoin, amber and orange blossom, the oil symbolises the gifts of the Holy Spirit and Christian virtue.

So, why am I telling you this? I am telling you this as we are all at a cross roads in our lives, for some it is being crowned, for others it is thinking about what the new king means for us as a nation, some of us may be dealing with changing situations at home, illness, some of us are struggling at work, some giving birth, getting married, others are bringing new lives onto their farms, lambing, which is demanding and costly.

Whatever the changes we face, mMay we take heart, and find encouragement, in that God's anointing does not just stick on kings at their coronations, his blessing touches and strengthens anyone who asks for it, he is always with us, he is always with you, that is what his love and Jesus' Easter Resurrection bought us all. The promise that we are held and loved. So, as you walk around our villages, take note of the blossoms or the bird song, as you watch the coronation of King Charles, try to remember that they are signs of God's anointing and blessing holding us all and that he has a plan to watch over us, king and pauper alike, that is full of hope and worth celebrating.

May God bless us all this May. Fr Murray

They meet in church at 11a.m and stay for the beginning of the service and after a blessing from Father Murray go out to the Little House for their own activities. Food Basket for Hope Central

From Sunday 6th November, a basket will be placed in Church on a weekly basis for non-perishable food donations. This will be taken each Monday for distribution by Hope Central, a local Christian Charity.


As well as the usual staple tins and packet foods which are so necessary, why not put a few extra goodies in for Christmas. We all need treats.

UK foodbanks busier than ever

More food parcels were given out in the UK this past year than ever before. During December 2022, an emergency food parcel was handed out the equivalent of every eight seconds. These are the most recent figures from the Trussell Trust, which supports more than 1300 foodbanks in the UK.

In all, the charity says it gave out nearly three million food parcels between April 2022 and April 2023. More than one million of these were for children. These three million parcels from the charity's foodbanks represent a 37-per-cent increase in England on 2021. And more than 760,000 people used a foodbank for the first time, which is up more than one third in 2021-22.

Soaring inflation and energy costs have driven the increase in demand. The charity reports an unprecedented rise in the number of employed people using their foodbanks, because they are "no longer able to balance a low income against rising living costs."

The problem now, says the trust, is that food donation levels are not keeping up with the need. "This is putting us under a lot of strain."

Worshipping online looks set to carry on

We still enjoy 'going to church' online. In fact, recent viewing figures for the Cof E's national online services reveal that they continue to receive about 150,000 views a week. Overall, in 2022, they attracted more than eight million views.

It was in March this year that the C of E marked three years since the start of the online services, which were begun during the Covid lockdown. By the end of that first year, it was found that clips and content from the services across the country had been seen 40 million times on social-media channels.

The current figure of 150,000 a week is thought to be conservative. As a Church House spokesman in London said: "Our analysis in May 2022 showed that 20 per cent of viewers watched with at least one other person, so this would have meant at least another 30,000 views." The C of E online service on New Year's Day gained 800,000 views alone.

And weekly production of services continues. Services are broadcast on social-media channels every Sunday, via YouTube and Instagram. They cover all the C of E traditions, and include estates churches, military chaplaincies, rural parishes, multiple church benefices, big county town churches, and cathedrals.

As one vicar said, "Worship online has made such an enormous difference. Now we live-stream absolutely everything, and I am really passionate about that."

What makes June so special

June is the month of light – the month of the summer solstice, when millions of people in northernmost Europe stay out late to enjoy the sight of the midnight sun. To have light and glory where there is usually darkness is something we celebrate, we welcome.

In John 9 Jesus said: "I am the light of the world." He was not comparing Himself to the summer solstice, but preaching at a Jewish occasion which celebrated light every bit as much. It was the Feast of Tabernacles (John 7:14), which was a celebration not only of God's provision of water, but also of the light of God's presence with the Israelites in the wilderness.

During the Feast of Tabernacles there was a joyful celebration. The priests would light four huge lamps in the Court of Women. The flames would reach as high as the temple walls and would provide a light that could be seen all throughout Jerusalem. Men of deep piety would dance throughout the night for the entire week of celebrating. A choir, accompanied by an orchestra of instruments, would sing psalms like Psalm 27, which declare "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

At the height of this grand celebration, the Lord Jesus had the temerity to stand and say that HE was the light that was foreshadowed by the light for the Israelites in the wilderness.

The Jewish leaders were furious, and tried to stone Him to death. Jesus did not fight back, He simply illustrated His claim to be the Light of the World by immediately giving sight to a man born blind. (John 9).


In the twenty centuries since then, the Word of God, when it is proclaimed, has drawn people out of the darkness and into the light of Jesus. The Word is, as the psalmist said, "a lamp to my feet and a light for my path" (Psalm 119:105). David said, "In your light we see light" (Psalm 36:9b). Today, by the light of the Word of God, we can see Jesus as He is: truly the Light of the World.

Please join the 'St Oswald's Lower Peover 100 Club'

Dating from 1269, St Oswald's church has been central to the village of Lower Peover for centuries. Throughout that time, it has been the spiritual home of many people, and not just those living in the village itself. It still fulfils that role today, a peaceful haven in an ever busier and complicated world. As a Grade 1 listed building, it enjoys a setting of particular importance, and the assumption is that it always will be. But escalating costs mean that we can no longer take that for granted. Buildings such as St Oswald's are hugely expensive to maintain and ever-increasing running costs need to be found.

It is a sobering thought that our Parish Share (the money we pay to Chester Diocese for our church and a vicar) is £51,395. That is £988 each week. That is before any lighting, heating, maintenance etc. is taken into consideration, and, contrary to what many people still think, the State does <u>not</u> pay towards a church's upkeep.

We launched the 100 Club in May 2008 and membership currently stands at 71, although it has been as high as 106. The club currently raises about £2,500 each year (after prizes) and really does make a huge difference to our resources. So far it has raised over £25,000 for the running costs of our church. And all for the minimal cost of £1 per week to members!

The 100 Club works in this way:

We collect £1 a week from each member per number held, which can be paid either as an annual fee of £52, or £13 per quarter, by standing order. Members are allocated individual numbers and each month two numbers are drawn. The first receives a prize of £70, the second receives £30. The remainder of the proceeds go to the church. You may individually hold more than one number and indeed, past winners have often had multiple holdings. It really is as simple as that! The 100 Club is designed to appeal to regular churchgoers and those people who may not be able to worship regularly with us, but who also think it is important that the church remains open as an important part of village life. We really would like to get our membership back up to at least 100 and hope that if you are reading this you may feel able to help – all for £1 per week! Please do join the 100 Club by completing the membership form at the back of this magazine or online at our website, and simply post it back to me. Many congratulations to all our winners – and our thanks to all members who are currently supporting the 100 Club. Stay safe and thank you.



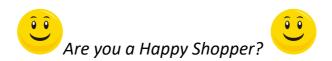
